Elizabeth is learning the ukelele



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Elaine writes:

y husband is full of good ideas – it's official!

I have been the recipient of these "good ideas" for many years now, which has resulted in me getting stuck in a peat bog up to my thighs after being told to jump from tuft to tuft of grass.

Another occasion which comes to mind is when we had to climb down a waterfall when the mist suddenly descended leaving us with no compass bearing (in the days before GPS).

Tip toeing through the heather on the North York Moors in a howling whiteout snowstorm was another memorable trip out (this time saved by GPS) and whilst I feel I should have learned my lesson, a recent "short cut" meant that we had to descend a 1:3 gradient on slippery mud and rocks on a narrow pathway with a whole load of nothing to our right. Are we having fun yet?

Following someone who is full of good ideas requires a significant level of trust (or insanity in my case!)

What struck me, on our recent foray into my own personal terror movie, was that the prospect of embarking on something hugely challenging was not as impossible as I had thought. In the beginning, the steep drop looked as though it was the end of the world, but journeying, bit by bit along the path, revealed a turning and another path to confront.

Each drop and turn brought us nearer to our destination – and, to my mind, safety – but to reach that destination meant encounter, encounter with my own fears and my own feelings of inadequacy.

I am usually a really positive, glass-half-full type of person who sees the world in terms of possibilities and opportunities, but when I am under the kinds of stress which make me feel unsafe then the light at the end of the tunnel is narrowed down to the tiniest pinprick.

Stepping from the darkness into the light requires courage and faith and we don't always realise that the things we have decided we can't do are things we very probably can. If we are prepared to encounter those situations we'd prefer to avoid, then we might discover things about ourselves which remain hidden.

We don't have to embark on a journey alone: there are others who we can trust to help, along with trusting in God who promises in so many passages in Scripture, to be with us.

Trust in the Lord with all your heart and rely not on your own understanding. In all your ways, acknowledge him and he will make straight your path. Proverbs 3 verses 5 and 6.

St George's Church is re-opening for public worship

WE HAVE BEEN moving carefully as restrictions have eased, and for a few weeks now the church has been open for private prayer. As things have evolved, we now have the opportunity to come into church to worship once again. The first services in church will be on **Wednesday 5th August at 9.30am** for Morning Prayer (also live streamed), and then at **10.00am** for Book of Common Prayer Communion (not live streamed.) Our first Sunday service in church will be on **Sunday 9th August at 10.15am**, when there will be Common Worship Communion, which will also be live streamed.

There will be stewards on duty to guide you, and hand sanitizer available for you to use. Please wear a face mask if you can, but we will also have some disposable masks available for you to use. There will be a one-way system in church (you will be guided), and alternate rows of pews will be blocked off to ensure social distancing. Families who live together in a bubble may sit together, but otherwise there will be markers in the pews as a guide to social distancing. As part of the government's Track and Trace scheme to monitor the spread of Coronavirus, we will be asking you to complete a consent form so we can store details for 21 days. We are not permitted to sing hymns at the moment, but on Sundays there will be organ music, and a single voice will sing parts of the service. Holy Communion will be in one kind as bread only, and the stewards will guide you when it is time to move to the front to receive Communion. Unfortunately, for the time being, we are not permitted to offer refreshments after the services.

We very much look forward to seeing you again in church in the near future. Further details are available on our website, and on the church's Facebook page (facebook.com/stgeorgeschurchstockport).

Alireza Kalantari was baptised on Monday 13th July, and when Elaine asked him for a comment afterwards, Ali said that he felt "New born".



Ringing the bells again

Our church bells were last rung for a service on the morning of Sunday 15th March. On the immediately following Tuesday, churches were shut, and ringing suspended until further notice – it seems quite a long time ago! Now that churches are permitted to open again, and services will soon be possible, albeit in what will of necessity be a modified form, plans are also being made to get back to ringing. This too will be rather different from what we are used to, though perhaps not as drastic as the rather amusing cartoon on page 23 of the July edition of *Grapevine*!

The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers has communicated at length with the Church of England's Recovery Group and Public Health England to agree a suitable strategy to enable a safe return to ringing. Nevertheless, providing the necessary guidance hasn't been easy, as ringing rooms vary considerably from one church to another in terms of size, location and access. The recommendations, though somewhat 'one-size-fitsall', do provide a framework which can be applied to local conditions.

On the resumption of ringing, we will be limited to just fifteen minutes at each session; this is a little less than we normally ring on Sunday mornings, but it will be a start. Under normal circumstances we have more ringers present than there are bells to be rung, which enables people to have a break, but the guidance permits only one ringer per bell and does not allow ringers to change bells between each piece of ringing – a sensible precaution to prevent transmission of the virus through ringers handling different ropes. It does, however, mean that we will have to draw up a rota to ensure that nobody turns up unnecessarily. These particular requirements will mean that we shall be ringing for Sunday services only, and will not be able to hold practices until hopefully there is an eventual relaxation of present requirements. The major problem in all towers is maintaining social distancing at 2m. At St George's we're fortunate in having a very spacious ringing room and a widely-spaced circle of ropes. Even so, to ensure there is 2m between ringers while ringing, we will need to leave out alternate bells and ring just five of the full ring of ten. This will sound very different from what everyone is used to hearing when church bells are rung. Traditionally the bells form a descending diatonic scale, but leaving bells out will produce a descending arpeggio. Choosing the bells to produce the best harmonious effect is therefore important and, though we have a good idea of what will work satisfactorily, a little experimentation may be necessary.

Ventilation is another important issue, and again we are fortunate in having windows in the ringing room that are easily accessed for opening and closing. A final consideration is access. In some churches the bells are rung from the ground floor at the base of the tower (as at St Bartholomew's, Wilmslow) or from a gallery open to the nave of the church (as at St Mary's Cheadle.) At St George's, access to the ringing room is via eighty-three steps of enclosed spiral staircases in two sections, divided by an internal enclosed walkway high in the south transept. Here again, distancing is the main issue, but one we can best solve by ensuring we leave sufficient time between our individual ascents and descents. All in all, there will be much to implement, but the application of common sense should enable a safe return to ringing.

Bells have always been not only a call to worship, but also a very audible reminder of the Church's presence in our community. Together with ringers all over the country, we are looking forward to getting back up in our towers and enjoying the application and teamwork required to make that very special sound!

Recipe of the month: Quiche with Hummus

The recipe I found for this was somewhat vague, so I have expanded it and hope it will make sense. I have made it twice: first time exactly as it is below, the second time I was making it for some people who couldn't eat peppers so I used ordinary hummus and for the chopped pepper I substituted some courgette and mushrooms.

Pastry to line tin

1 pepper, or two halves, whichever colour you like, or mixed, chopped Good handful frozen peas 1-2 sticks celery, depending on size, chopped ½ pot red pepper hummus 3 eggs small tub single cream seasoning, including cayenne or chilli 1 mozzarella ball, sliced or torn apart parmesan cheese optional

Line dish/tin with pastry. About 8-9 ins/20-22 cm.

Fry peppers and celery, add peas. When cooled, put in the pastry case. Mix the hummus, eggs, cream, add seasoning including cayenne and pour over the vegetables in the pastry case. Top with pieces of mozzarella. If wanted, sprinkle the top with grated parmesan. Bake at 190C for 30 mins.

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


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


